It is with a great honor that I nominate Mr. Gene Fawbush for induction into the Kentucky Golf Hall of Fame. I have personally known Gene for over 40 years and have always enjoyed and admired his dedication to the game of golf. Golfing great, Fuzzy Zoeller, affectionally calls Gene, "the Legend" and for good reasons. Gene is one of the best teachers of the game of golf who has lived and taught golf for over 50 years in the State of Kentucky. Gene has been awarded the highest honor as "teacher of the year" in the Kentucky Section on two occasions. He is a Horton Smith Award winner and been one of Kentucky's top players for his entire career. The enclosed bio reflects on his many tournament accomplishments and his ability to play a"great" game of golf. This includes his world record 26 on the front nine holes at Standard Country Club in 1969 and five victories in the Kentucky Senior Open Championship along with many other tournament accomplishments.

Mr. Gene Fawbush has been the PGA Golf Professional at Oldham Country Club, teaching Professional at Big
Spring Country Club (1967-1968), head assistant and teaching Professional at Standard Country Club, and Head PGA
Golf Professional at Glenwood Hall Country Club in Carrolton, Kentucky. Gene is still very active and at the ripe old age
of 84 is still teaching and playing a great game of golf and shooting up to 10-12 strokes lower than his age.

Mr. Gene Fawbush is most deserving of the opportunity to join the Kentucky Golf Hall of Fame. It would be great to have him inducted while he is still with us and able to share some of his great stories about his career.

Gene Fawbush

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For more than 40 years Gene Fawbush has taught the game of golf.

No matter the age or skill level, if a person wants to learn, then Gene is ready to work with them to bring a better understanding of the game he has dedicated his life to.

And, like all great teachers, Gene has become much more than just a mentor or an advisor, but a friend as well. This approach has made him one of the great ambassadors for the game in Kentucky and makes him more than qualified for induction into the Kentucky Golf Hall of Fame.

Gene's dedication to the game and especially to the teaching of the game to young people has left a lasting impact on the lives of everyone he has come into contact with.

Under his guidance, these youngsters have gone on to success not only at the state level, but the national level as professionals at clubs and on the PGA and LPGA.

The list of students and former students like Steve Flesch, Julie Zembrodt, Debbie Blank, Peggy Freeman and Joyce Abbott reads like a Who's Who in Kentucky golf.

It is, however, not the guidance given to these well known golfers, but the lessons given to the thousands of people who play for a simple love of the game. Lessons that have done nothing but enhance their enjoyment of the game, by which Gene can be measured as well.

For his efforts, Gene has been recognized by his peers winning the PGA's Teacher of the Year in 1987 and 1989 and earning the Horton Smith Award in 1980.

"A very important lesson Gene taught me is to give back to your profession, I have witnessed in many cases, my own included, Gene give up his time to teach someone because they were struggling. Often times, it did not matter at what level they played the game. One thing all these students had in common was a love for the game of golf. I recommend that Gene Fawbush be inducted into the Hall of Fame. He has continually give back to his profession through his time and instills in his students a love and respect for the sport. By recognizing Gene, his contributions to the sport will be the benchmark for future teaching professionals in the state of Kentucky."

Through his long career, Gene has also been one of the most respected and successful professionals on the tournament circuit around the state.

Gene is a six-time senior sections champion taking his first title in 1978 and his last in 1987. He ha also played in the Pepsi Challenge Cup five times.

At 78, an age when most people have scaled back their activities, Gene is out there everyday playing and teaching. Working with anyone who wants to get better and learn and always with young people in may cases giving them an introduction to a game that will provide them with a lifetime of accomplishment, memories and friendship that can't be measured.

Through the years of teaching and playing Gene has developed lasting friendships for himself and his family.

Gene and his wife, Betty Jo, have raised three children and have lived in the same house for nearly 50 years. The pair are devoted to their children and their seven grandchildren to this day and to their neighbors, many of whom have lived on the same street for as many years as Gene and Betty have.

Gene's legacy to the game is and will be one of dedication, education and passion. His accomplishments are many and varied, and to Gene's credit, could just have easily gone by without fanfare or to someone else who Gene felt was just as deserving.

Gene exemplifies what a golf professional is and should be and is someone the Kentucky golf Hall of Fame should be proud to call a member.

"Gene spent countless hours with me honing my game both mentally and physically, not once taking a penny for his work. This was how Gene worked. If he saw a young person who was dedicated to the game and really worked at it he gave of his time. Who today, or then, could we say this about. I know that had it not been for Gene I would not have won Women's Kentucky State Am two years in a row, I would not have received a full golf scholarship to the University of Kentucky or I would not have won the many tournaments I did if it weren't for Gene taking the time to notice my potential and giving me the confidence to do with the game what I did.I truly feel it way past due for Gene to receive this high honor. He deserves to be in the Hall of Fame for he has given so much of himself for the benefit of so many and especially the core of the sport - junior golf."

After college I entered the PGA Apprentice program and advanced through the program until I became a member and head PGA professional.
