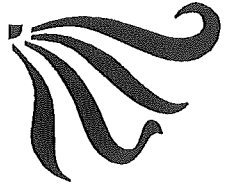

On July 19th my uncle, Steve Rogers, of Bowling Green accompanied by my father, Dr. Ronald "Butch" Rogers, as his caddie, shot a 73 after a 2 hole playoff at Panmure Golf Club in Angus, Scotland to qualify for the 2010 British Senior Open later that week at the famed Carnoustie Golf Club.

The qualifying event was held over 3 courses as 268 hopefuls from all over the world tried to qualify for the event.

In what turned out to be a rainy day 14 of the 20 holes they completed were in terrential downpour, a birdie on the second playoff hole captured Steve's Spot in the 2010 British Senior Open.

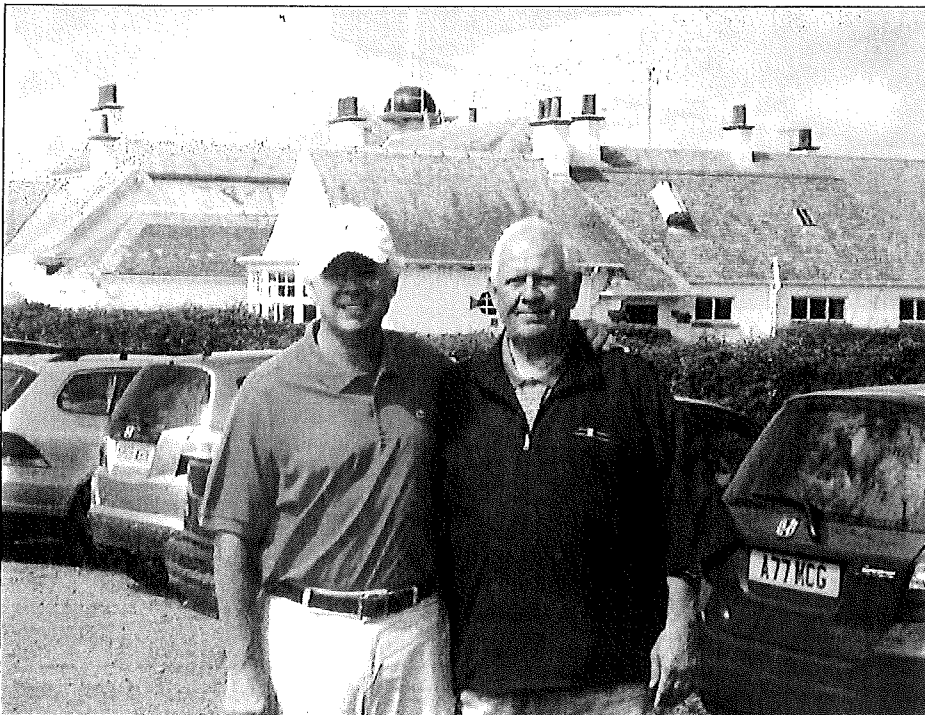
This had him competing against some of the top golfers in the world including Sir Nick Faldo, Tom Watson, Bernhard Langer, and this year's Ryder Cup Captain, Corey Pavin.

The tournament was played at famed Carnoustie Golf Club, which is one of the 10 oldest golf courses in the world and ranked as one of the toughest.

This completes a pretty impressive feat for an amateur golfer, as he has now qualified for his second Major Championship in 2 years. He played last year in the 2009 Senior US Open at Crooked Stick in Carmel, IN.
