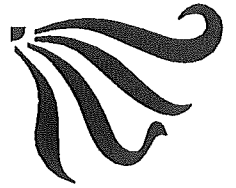

Tommy Settle was born on February 17, 1942 in Owensboro, Ky

1954, 1955 and 1956 he was the Owensboro Jr. Champion at Owensboro Country Club

In 1957 he won Junior City Champion

1962 was Men's City Champion

While attending Owensboro Senior High School he lettered five straight years (8th thru 12th)

Won regional championships 4 out of the 5 years

Tommy was Individual Regional Champion 1958 and 1959, and was runner-up in 1957

He was JC Jr. City Champion 1957, 1958 and 1959

State JC. Champion in 1957 and 1959

Tri- State Jr. Champion in 1958 and 1960 in Evansville, Indiana

Tommy won the Men's Kentucky State amateur Championship in 1959 and still holds the record for the youngest to ever win

Tom Settle defeated Charlie Matthews on Sunday in match play to win the Men's Club Golf Championship at the Shelbyville Country Club.

For his win, Settle was awarded silver and the tourney's traveling trophy. Matthews received merchandise for his second-place finish in the

championship flight.

The golfers began qualifying for the tourney on July 24. With the end of the qualifying round July 30, the 83 golfers were assigned to nine flights and put into match play.

year's tourney, Phil White, who served as this year's tourney director, defeated McRae on the 38th hole.

After leading by five strokes going into the final 18 holes yesterday, Settle increased his lead to seven strokes at the end of 27 holes by carding a one-under-par 34 on the front nine.

"I guess I just cased up a bit on the second nine today," said the two-time champion after coming off the 18th green. "I seemed to have trouble with my irons on the last few holes."

Settle had three bogeys on the last four holes. He bogeyed 15, 16 and 18 as well as No. 12, and had a birdie on the 14th for a three-over-par 38 on the back nine.

Pritchett, who was one over par on the front nine, came in with a par 35 on the back nine to gain runnerup honors. For the two days he had 74-71-145. Gene Van Stone was third with 75-72-147, while Gene Austin, the fourth golfer in the cham-

pionship flight, withdrew after an opening round of 76.

Bobby Bender won the 14-and-under division for the second consecutive year with a 40 for each day's nine-hole round. He finished four strokes ahead of Dan Hewins, who carded a 42-42-84.

Bobby, who is 13-years-old, finished second in 1958, and there is additional bad news for the younger group. Bobby will be eligible to defend his title again next year.

The most dramatic happening of the second day's play was the three-way playoff for second place in the second flight of the 14-and-under division.

Norm Davenport was the

first of the three boys to finish the regulation nine holes yesterday. He had a 49 to go along with his 45 of the first day, putting him six strokes behind the winner, Steve Sanders.

Then Phil Fischer came in with a 47-47-94 and a playoff was needed.

Steve Coale shot a 48-47-95, but it developed that he had called a one stroke penalty on himself for hitting the ball out of bounds when actually it stayed in bounds.

One of the other players in Steve's foursome told tourney officials about this, and it was agreed that Steve should not have penalized himself and should take part in the tie-breaker.

A crowd of about 30 followed the three youngsters on the tenth hole.

Davenport, who was the winner, carded a five, while Fischer took a six, Coale shot seven.

Dave Smith won the third flight in the 14-and-under division, while Greg Hallam was second. The winner in the fourth flight was Mike Miller and John Williamson won runnerup honors. Barbara Greenwell was the winner in the fifth flight and Chet Rycroft was second.

At the end of the tourney Frank Starkey, manager of Sears, in Evansville, presented trophies to the winners and runnersup in all flights.

Settle qualifies for tourney

During the years Tom Settle has been playing golf, he has won numerous championships and set several course records. And during the latter part of this month, he will have the opportunity of a lifetime as he competes in the 1978 U. S. Amateur Championship in Plainfield, N. J.

Settle qualified for the tournament recently by firing a 73 and a 71 for 36 holes at the Big Springs Country Club in Louisville. He said the competition was open to anyone and two slots in the national competition were up for grabs.

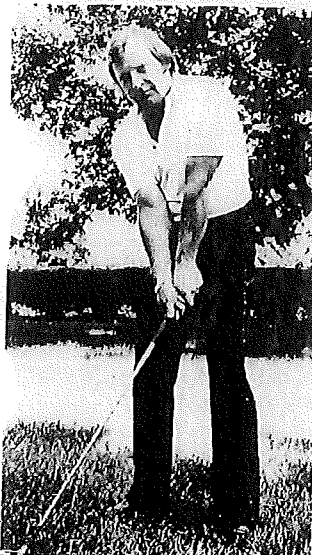
Jody Mudd edged Settle out with a 68 and a 74 for top honors. However, both men will be making the trip to the Plainfield Country Club for the championships Aug. 29-Sept. 3.

Usually just one person from the state goes to such an amateur championship, Settle said. This year marked his fourth attempt at the honor.

Earlier this month, Settle won the championship at the local country club. Last year he won the tournament completing the course 14 under par. He shot a 63 on Aug. 3, 1977 which he says is a record for competitive play at the course.

This year Settle came close to beating his own record and finished 12 under par. But the match was over before he completed the course so he didn't even try to break his record, he said.

Settle has competed in two national amateur junior championships. In 1959, he was the state junior medalist and went on to compete in the junior amateur championship sponsored by the U. S.

Golfers Association in California. The same year he also competed in the National Jaycee Tournament in Portsmouth, Va.

But, the list of tournaments and championships Settle competed in during 1959 doesn't stop there. He won the state Coca-Cola tournament, the men's state amateur tournament and various other club championships. "It was the biggest year I've ever had," Settle said.

At age 11, Settle won his first competition, the junior club championship at Owensboro. He is 36 now and says he has been playing golf for about 27 years.

Settle was the youngest player to ever capture the men's state amateur title. He did that when he was 17 and nobody has ever broken the record. "I don't think they ever will either," he said.

Bear Bryant, the noted coach at the University of Alabama, was so impressed with Settle's ability on the golf course that he signed him to the

university's first full golf scholarship in 1960.

Settle said he was the first golfer to live in the athletic dormitory which was primarily inhabited by football players.

After college, Settle considered turning pro but decided against it. As a matter of fact, he didn't even play golf for a few years.

As the manager of Claudia Sanders' Dinner House, Settle doesn't always have time to practice golf. During the first few months of this year he said he rarely played. But during the last month he has spent a lot of time at the local country club.

Each day Settle likes to practice at least two hours. Right now he is working on his concentration in preparation for the national tourney.

But for Settle golf is merely a way to relax and get away from the routine of running the restaurant. "It's my only real release from work," he said.

Settle said his wife Cherry and their children, Tom, who is four, and Jennifer, who is 7-months-old, sometimes watch him play golf.

Tom Jr. has joined his dad on the course and used a club a few times. "My little boy likes to go out and putt around," Settle said.

He said his golfing career began when he went out with his dad at a similar age and sank a putt from about 35 feet.

As for the national tourney, Settle is counting the days until then. "It's an honor just to get to play in the championship," he said. "I wouldn't miss that for anything."

Settle Captures WCC Invitational

Tommy Settle, in a hard-driving finish, fired a four-under-par 71 Sunday for a 36-hole total of 146 to capture the championship of the Windridge Invitational Golf Tournament.

The former state amateur finalist added another tournament victory to his collection by coming from three strokes back of the pace set by first-round leader Hilton Snyder.

Settle carded a par 35 on the front nine of the final 18 and came in with a torrid 31 on the last nine holes of play.

Birdies on each of the 11th, 13th and 15th holes aided Settle in warding off the challenge of second-place finisher Bill Bewley of Glasgow, who shot a final round of 35-37-72 and an overall total of 149.

After shooting a 77 in the first day of the tourney, defend-

Teen-Agers Lack Interests? Not Golf Star Tommy Settle

In his impressive list of golfing honors won during the spring and summer, the 17-year-old Owensboroan, who wants to be a pro, has revealed only one crack in his emotional armor—and that was when a ball struck a bystander. In school, his marks are average, but he works hard at his studies and his determination earns praise from his teachers.

OWENSBORO, Ky., Aug. 1.— for the National Junior Championships Tournament to be played in Palo Alto, Cal., August 5 through 8.

He will go to Portsmouth, Va., August 22-29 with George Deming, Louisville; Joe Belote, Mayfield, and Mike Klien, Louisville, to represent the state in the National Jaycee Juniors Tournament.

Since the age of nine Tommy's singleness of purpose has given him a more complicated life than most youngsters experience. It was about that time that his father, Fred M. Settle, a salesman, took Tommy, his older brother, Fred, Jr., and his older sister, Suzanne, golfing with him at the Owensboro Country Club.

It was love at first putt for Tommy. When his Fifth Grade class held Hobby Day, Tommy listed his main interest as golf.

His answer to "What are you going to be when you grow up?" was always, "A golf pro."

When a few Owensboro women began teaching a group of children the fundamentals and etiquette of tournament play on Junior Day at the country club, Tommy was one of the most faithful pupils.

At 12, he won the club's junior tournament. The next two years, 1955 and '56, he was runner-up in the same contest, bowing only to his brother, Fred Settle, Jr. In 1956, he also was runner-up in the Inter-City Junior Tournament, which included players from Owensboro, Henderson, Madisonville and Hopkinsville.

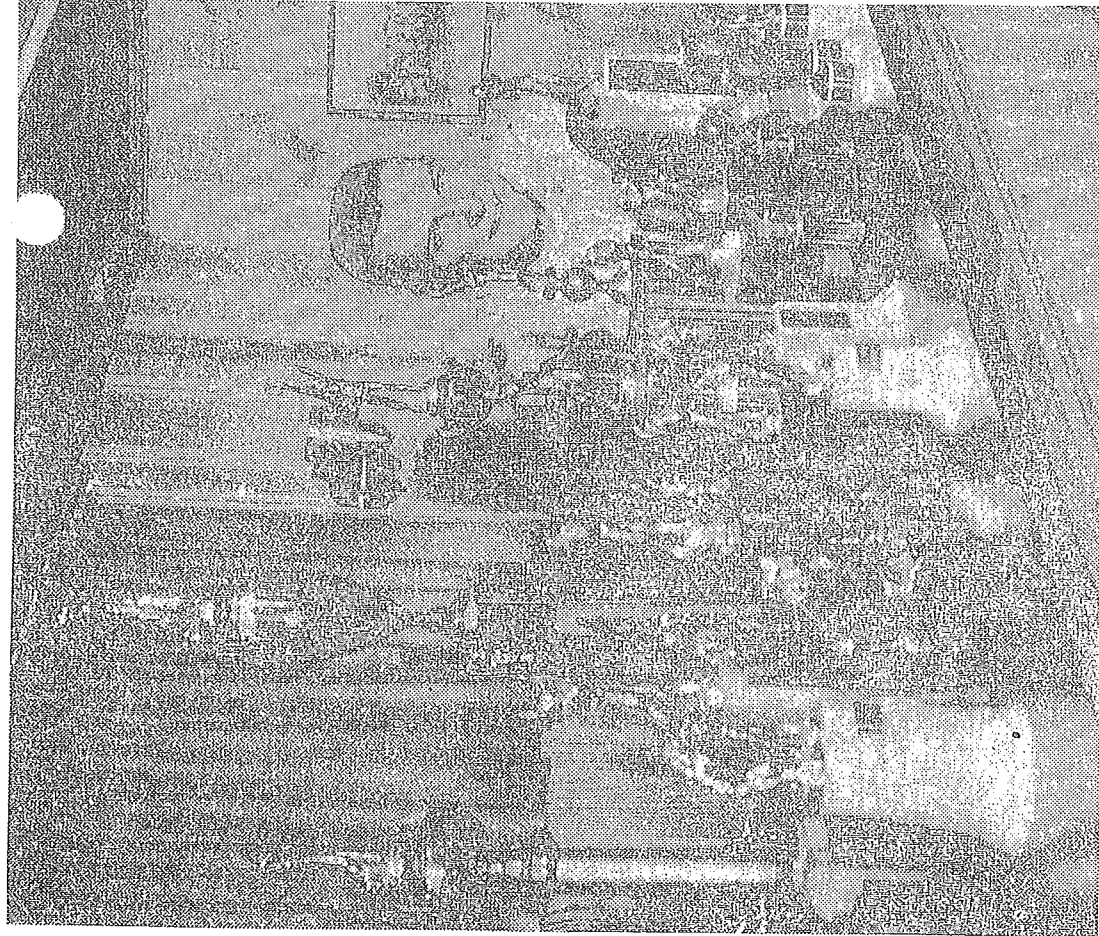
Won State Jaycee

He won the Owensboro Junior Jaycee for three years, and the State Jaycee in 1957, as well as this year.

In 1958, Tommy won the Owensboro Junior Boys' Tournament and the Sears Junior Tri-State Open at Evansville, and was runner-up in the Regional High School Tournament and in the Jaycee Memorial Tournament at Madisonville.

He and Fred won the Inter-City team championship for three successive years.

Up to now the State Amateur is the tournament which has taken the heaviest toll on the

Settle, Ellington in U.S. Amateur

Fones upsets Varga to win boys' 18 title in Closed tourney

Former state amateur champion Tommy Settle and Paul Ellington, bot of Louisville, will be joining Jodie Mudd in the USGA Amateur Championship at The Olympic Club in San Francisco Sept. 1-6.

Settle, who won a Kentucky title in 1959, and Ellington were the low qualifiers in a 36-hole elimination yesterday at Lindsey Golf Club at Ft. Knox. Settle recorded a one over par 73 and a 75 for a total of 148. Ellington, who attended Brevard, Fla., Junior College the past school year, had rounds of 75 and 74.

Mudd was exempt from qualifying because he was a member of the U.S. Walker Cup team which will play matches with a team of British and Irish golfers the weekend before at Pebble Beach, Calif.

The alternates are Jim Vincent of Owensboro (149), Harcourt Kemp of Louisville (150) and Pat Fitzgerald of Lexington (151).

TENNIS — Top-seeded players won titles yesterday in three of four divisions in both boys' and girls' play in the Kentucky Junior Closed tennis championships at Seneca Park.

Second-seeded Matt Fones of Franklin upset the No. 1 seed, St. Xavier graduate Paul Varga, to win the boys' 18 title. Fones edged Varga 6-4, 6-4.

Fourth-seeded Angel Long of Lexington defeated Jennifer Miller of Lexington, the No. 2 seed, 7-6, 7-6 to capture the girls' 12 title. Long won the first-set tiebreaker 7-4 and the second-set tiebreaker 7-2.

Bowling Green's Deborah Denton was the only top-seeded player among the six No. 1 seeds who won championships who didn't have to defeat the No. 2 seed in the title match. Denton beat third-seeded Kim Lehman of Lexington 6-4, 6-4 for the girls' 14 title.

In the other girls' finals, Kristin Buchanon of Elizabethtown edged

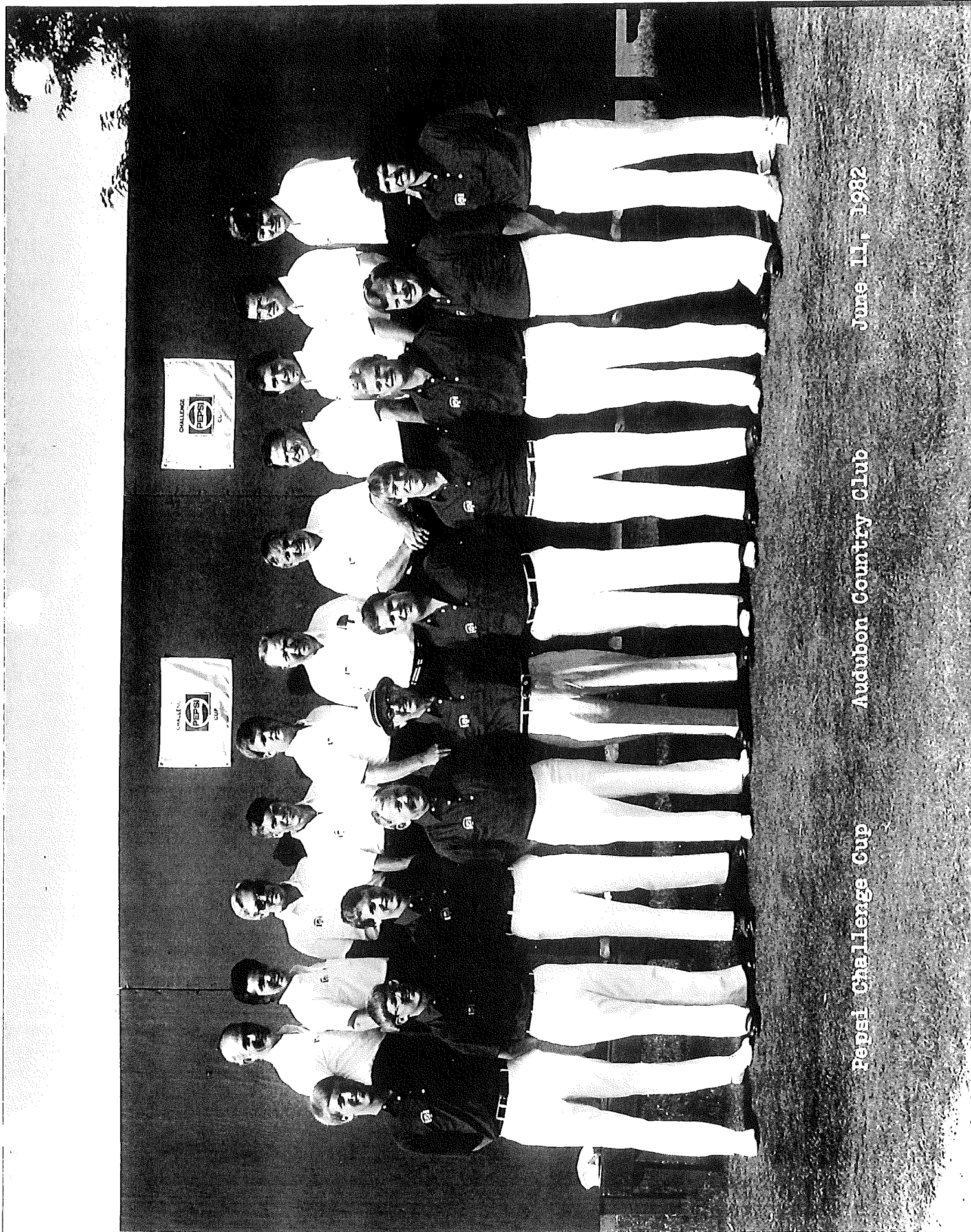
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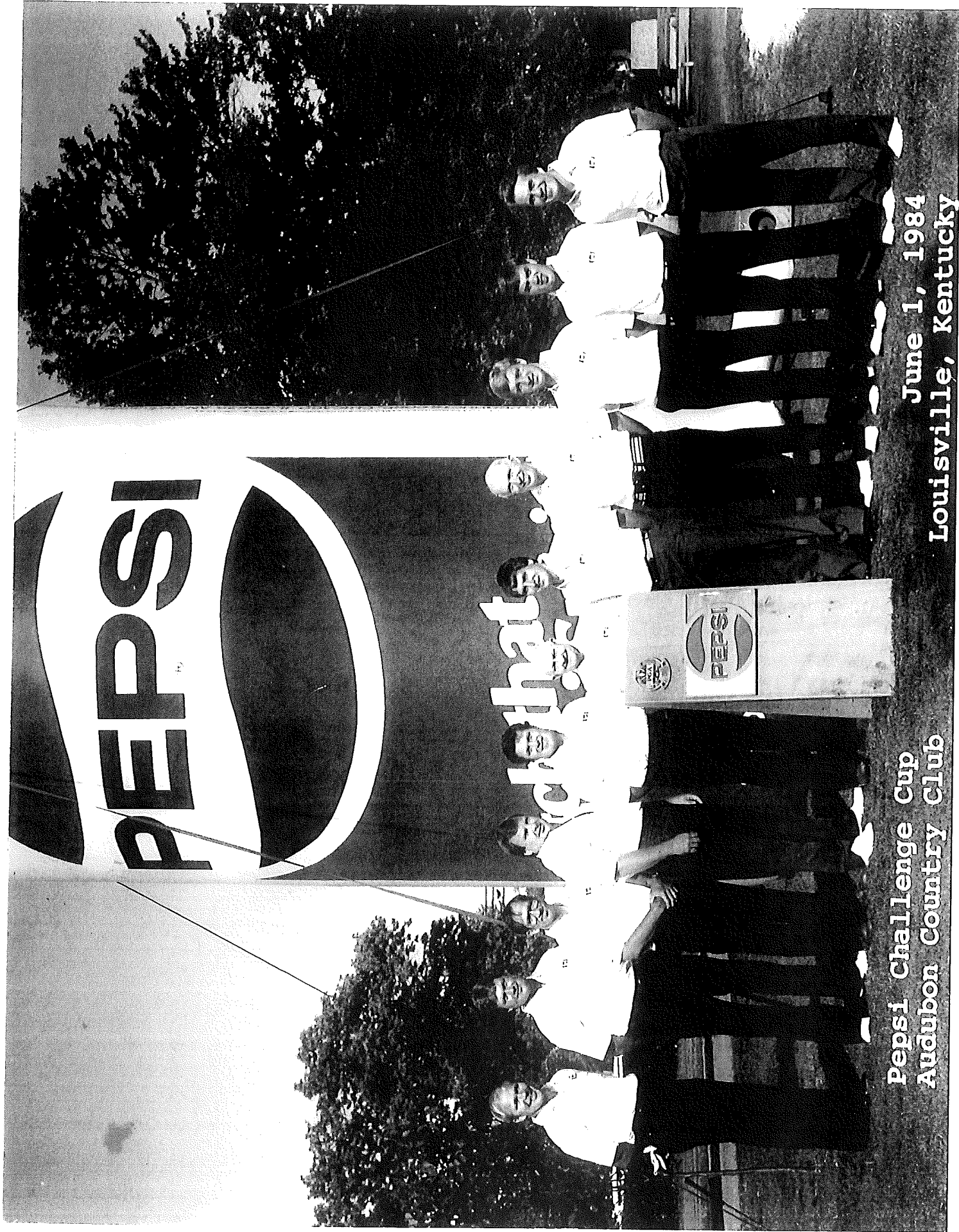

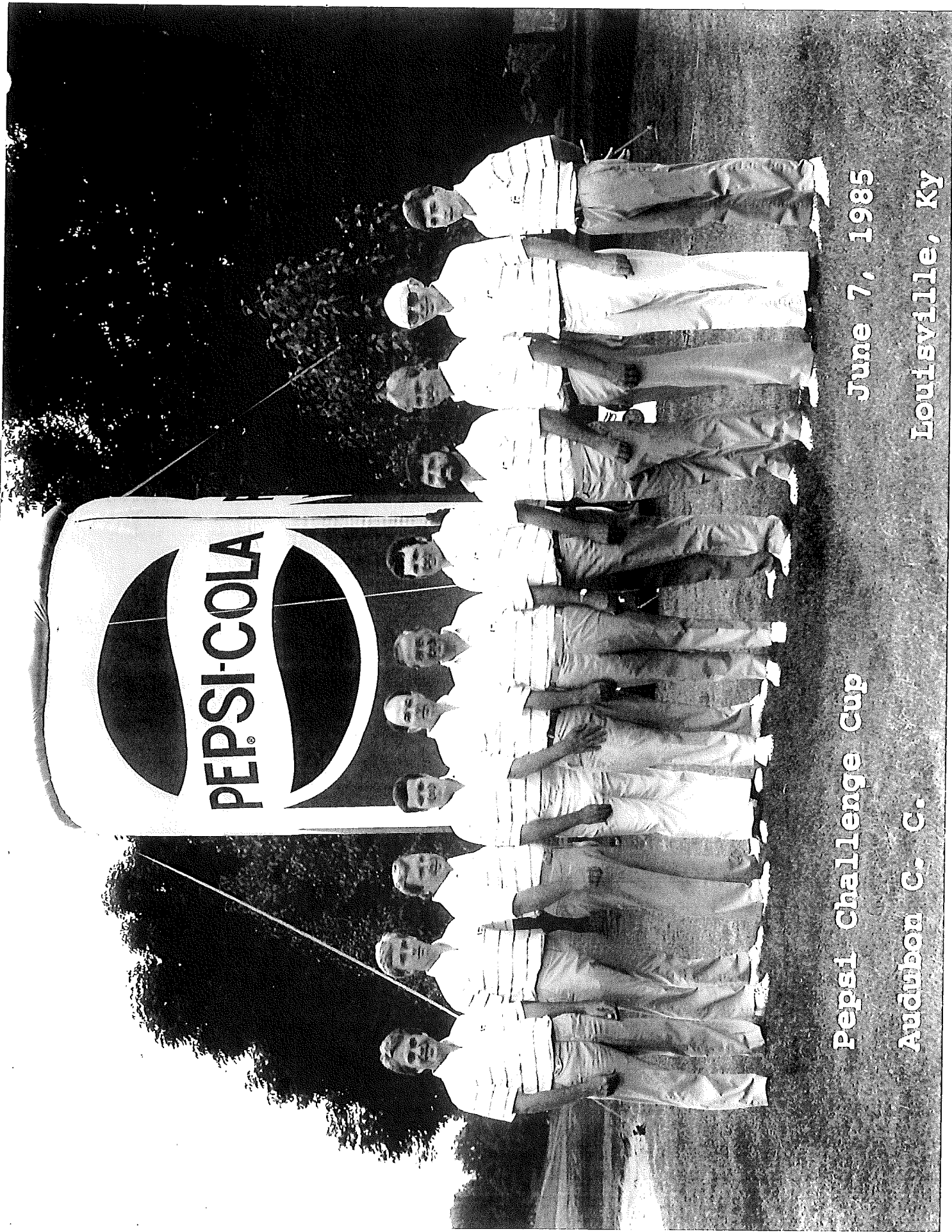
