Dr. Rex Chaney Biography:

Dr. Rex Chaney retired after his 38th season as the head coach of the Morehead State University golf program. Well respected in regional golfing circles, Chaney had tremendous success leading the Eagle golf program.

Under his supervision the Eagles captured the 1977, 1981, 1993 and 1999 Ohio Valley Conference titles, earning him OVC Golf Coach of the Year honors for each of those seasons.

Chaney's years of experience led to six other top three finishes in the OVC Championship. Chaney coached two OVC Players of the Year, three OVC Tournament medalists and five tournament runners up. In all, Chaney coached 29 all-tournament and all-conference players at Morehead State, including his son Lee and current PGA Tour pro Josh Teater.

Chaney also served in other coaching positions at MSU, including leading the baseball team from 1961-67. His baseball Eagles accumulated a 111-56 (.667) record, winning the OVC East Championship in 1961, 1962, 1963 (co-champions) and 1964. For his efforts, Chaney was named the OVC Baseball Coach of the Year in 1963.

He also served four years as assistant basketball coach under former boss Bob Laughlin.

Dr. Chaney is the only member of the Eagle Athletic Hall of Fame to be inducted while still a member of the coaching staff.

The golf mentor holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Morehead State and a doctorate in recreation from Indiana University. He joined the MSU Health, Physical Education and Recreation faculty in 1961.

A well respected golfer himself, Dr. Chaney was a student-athlete at Morehead State as a member of the track team.

Chaney is a native of Perry County, Kentucky. He has one daughter, Jennifer (Estill) and two grandchildren, Eric and Olivia. He is married to the former Sarah Kidwell of Bardstown, Ky. They have one son, Lee, who finished his career as a member of the MSU Eagle golf team in 2009.

Beloved Morehead State Coach, Professor Retires After 60 Years

Morehead State University recently held a retirement dinner for longtime coach <u>Dr. Rex Chaney</u>, who has been with the university since 1953.

Chaney, who previously coached the Eagles in men's basketball and baseball, spent the past 38 years as the head men's golf coach at MSU.



He was named the Ohio Valley Conference Men's Golf Coach of the Year after MSU captured league championships in 1977, 1981, 1993 and 1999. He also directed the Eagles to six other top-three finishes at the annual league tournament.

"I think Rex is an inspiration for just how many years he dedicated to this university," said Stephanie Barker, head women's golf


coach. "It's obvious that he was very giving as an individual, really cared, genuinely cared about the program and kids that he's helped over the years."

Chaney coached 20 All-OVC selections, six All-OVC Tournament honorees, six conference-tournament runners-up, three league-tournament medalists and two OVC Players of the Year.

The group includes current PGA Tour member Josh Teater.

"I grew up seeing how hard he worked to build the program," said Lee Chaney, Rex Chaney's son. "He preached a '54' mentality, believing in yourself, believing that you could go out and birdie every hole; but the main thing was to work hard, and if you worked hard you could be very successful."

Rex Chaney led the Eagles to a 111-56 (.665) record as head baseball coach from 1961-67. The OVC's 1963 Baseball Coach of the Year guided MSU to at least a share of the league's east division crown each year from 1961-64. He also served four
